Officials Trial Judge Program 2024

Skate Canada hosted a Trial Judge Program at the 2024-25 Skate Canada Challenge in Winnipeg, Manitoba. The purpose of this program was for officials to gain reports in the Singles and Pairs discipline, and to give smaller sections the opportunity to provide officials experience in disciplines that may not be well represented within their own section. Thirteen officials representing seven sections participated in this

Your dedication to the sport and your own ongoing development as officials is a crucial piece in the smooth running of events in our country. For those of you who also officiate internationally, thank you for your additional time away and for your willingness to be assigned as substitute judges should the need arise.

I am continuing my messaging theme from year one and year two as OAP Chair. In year three I successfully installed an update to my personal navigation system which I was most grateful for! I am pleased to say that my jigsaw puzzle became a more manageable 500 pieces, although I did find a few under the table throughout the year – clearly my update was not as efficient as MicroSoft! It was busy as usual with many Teams meetings with officials, committees, and my right hand in all of this, Laura Baker. This past season Skate Canada offered section outreach for officials' development opportunities. Singles Pathway

The new Senior Section Level Singles Judge pathway will be delivered to new Learning Facilitators May 22-25 in Toronto. Thank you to Reaghan Fortin, Sheila Beard, and Trevor Crowe for their work to update the materials, as well as the external review group who provided valuable feedback on the eLearning materials. The course will be formally launched in June 2025.



Ice Dance Pathway

The new Senior Section Level Ice Dance Judge pathway will be delivered to new Learning Facilitators June 19-22 in Toronto. Following the Toronto Training, the course will be piloted in four sections: British Columbia, Alberta, Quebec, and Atlantic Canada (Nova Scotia). Thank you to Hilary Quick, Leslie Lawrence, and Ethan Swinburnson for their time and effort to develop the materials, as well as the external review group who have provided valuable feedback on the eLearning materials. The course will be formally launched in July 2025.



Event Reports and Performance Feedback

Referees and Technical Controllers are required to complete a report for each event at domestic competitions. This report provides an opportunity for them to give feedback and recommendations to the Skate Canada Event Team on logistics as well as to OAP on the officiating performances of the judging/technical panels. We would like to again take this opportunity to share with you below the criteria used on these two reports:



INDIVIDUAL RATINGS

Using the rating scale listed below, please provide a rating for each of the judges/technical members on your panels for this event. Consider the following under each category:

Technical Skills:

<u>Judges:</u> Understanding of rules, integration of quality in GOE assessments, effective use of positive GOE's, accuracy of reductions, appropriate assignment of PC scores, reflects PC differences when warranted

<u>Technical Panel:</u> Understanding of technical knowledge/rules, calling process, review process, teamwork.

<u>Leadership/Deportment:</u> Self-management during competition and ability to manage stress, open-mindedness to other opinions, acts appropriately in situations, interacts well and/or demonstrates respect for athletes, officials, SC staff, volunteers, stakeholders

M-Meeting expectations of judging level of this event *no comment necessary or per referee's/TC's discretion

U-Unsure of ability/skill set/deportment at this event *please provide comments for the OAP committee

The objective of this performance management aspect of the event report is to watch for a pattern and not a "one off" bad day, which can happen to any of us. With the goal of transparency of these reports, the OAP feels it is important to share this with all Challenge and higher-level officials. If a pattern is noted throughout a competition, the OAP will provide the individual official with this feedback once all reports have been received, as well as provide them with suggestions on how to address the areas of development. To increase transparency, a "pattern" is defined as receiving a U rating in either two events in a row or two seasons in a row.
